Special features

The heart of the Garden is in the Scrape Glen. The Beech Walk gives a tree-top perspective and provides glimpses to the landscape of the Upper Tweed Valley, a National Scenic Area. The Heron Wood Reserve is home to fascinating fungi, mosses and lichens. There is an abundance of bird life throughout the Garden, including nuthatch and woodpeckers.

Enjoy

Once you have wandered through the Garden, relax with a cup of coffee and homemade cake, or browse through our shop for unusual gifts. Many of the plants we sell can be seen growing in the Garden, so you can even take a piece of Dawyck home with you.

Celebrate the seasons

See swathes of snowdrops, daffodils and bluebells in the spring and spectacular displays of azaleas, rhododendrons and Himalayan poppies in early summer. In the height of summer enjoy luxurious burnside herbaceous plantings of astilbes, hostas, ligularias and Rodgersias. By autumn the hues change to deep reds and yellows as the trees prepare for winter. Come back to experience the different faces of Dawyck throughout the year.
