OUR ORGANISATION

The Royal Botanic Garden Edinburgh is a world-leading centre for plant science, horticulture, and conservation, education, and public engagement. Founded in 1670 as a physic garden for the study of medicinal plants, it attracts over one million visitors each year and holds one of the world's most diverse botanical collections.

Through a wide network of national and international partnerships, we pursue our mission to Explore, Conserve and Explain the World of Plants, addressing global biodiversity loss and climate change.

Funding is drawn equally from Scottish Government Grant-in-Aid and self-generated income, reflecting our dual role as a public institution and an enterprising organisation. The continued growth of commercial activity, philanthropic support, and consultancy work is a key strategic priority for ensuring long-term sustainability and impact.





OUR STRATEGIC DIRECTION

Guided by the strategy *Responding to the Biodiversity Crisis and Climate Emergency (2021-2026)*, our work focuses on:

- Understanding plant and fungal diversity for the benefit of society: our scientific research seeks to understand the threats facing species and biomes, and how they respond to environmental change. We develop strategies and actions to conserve biodiversity both in Scotland and around the world.
- Conserving and developing botanical collections: we curate and enhance the National Botanical Collection as a living scientific and cultural heritage resource, and we support the development of botanical collections globally – particularly in partnerships with countries across the Global South.
- Engaging and educating people: we build global capacity to respond to the biodiversity and climate crises by sharing scientific, horticultural and conservation expertise through education and public engagement, inspiring people of all ages to value and protect the natural world.





OUR COLLECTIONS AND COMMUNITY

At the heart of our mission are the National Botanical Collections - the Living Collection, Herbarium and Library and Archives – which underpin science, horticulture, learning and conservation. The Living Collection is curated across four Gardens – Edinburgh, Benmore, Dawyck and Logan, spanning Scotland's varied climates. Together they hold around 13,500 plant species, many rare or threatened, making us a global leader in conservation horticulture and ex situ plant conservation.

- Edinburgh: a 72-acre garden just a mile from the city centre showcasing nearly 60,000 plants, at features including the world-renowned Rock Garden, Chinese Hillside and network of historic and modernist public Glasshouses, sitting alongside the crucial research houses, currently being restored through the Edinburgh Biomes Project.
- Benmore: set in the dramatic Argyll landscape, this 120-acre mountainside garden is famed for its rhododendron and conifer collections of global significance and is a key visitor attraction for the west coast, sitting at the gateway to Loch Lomond and The Trossachs National Park.
- Dawyck: in the heart of the Scottish Borders, is the most continental of our four sites and is an internationally renowned arboretum, playing a key role in conservation and climate resilience.
- Logan: on the mild Rhins of Galloway, in Dumfries & Galloway showcasing tender southern hemisphere plants, not generally seen growing outdoors this far north, alongside other temperate and maritime species in a striking and exotic setting.

Science, Conservation and Learning

Together, our Horticulture and Science teams collaborate to understand and conserve biodiversity, restore habitats, and develop sustainable plant management practices. The Living Collection provides the foundation for discovery science, conservation translocations and climate adaptation.

Training and skills development are central to our work. Through specialist degree and diploma programmes, short courses and online learning, we nurture professionals who go on to lead in horticulture, plant science, conservation and del-research education worldwide.

Community and Visitors

The four Gardens within the organisation are places of beauty and tranquillity, where visitors experience the restorative power of nature. From moments of quiet reflection to vibrant seasonal displays, they promote health, wellbeing and inspiration, deepening people's connection with the living world. The Gardens also inspire curiosity and creativity through education, art and community engagement.

A dedicated community of horticulturists, scientists, educators and volunteers share a passion for plants and a commitment to public benefit, conservation and environmental stewardship. Together, they create welcoming spaces that celebrate the diversity of life and the vital role plants play in sustaining it.

THE ROLE

We are looking for an inspiring and forward-thinking Director of Horticulture to shape and lead the delivery of our horticulture, champion the stewardship and growth of our globally significant Living Collections and strengthen our connections with communities and partners, locally, nationally and internationally.

As a member of our Executive Team, you will combine operational excellence with bold strategic vision. Your leadership will drive innovation in conservation horticulture, sustainability, climate resilience, and biodiversity recovery. You will also be a passionate advocate for horticulture — helping to elevate the profession and promote it as an exciting, rewarding career path for people from all backgrounds.

This role also includes leading our horticulture and botanic garden consultancy services and developing partnerships that generate income aligned with our mission, ensuring the Royal Botanic Garden Edinburgh continues to thrive and make a global impact.

Key responsibilities

Strategic and Operational Leadership

- Shape the future of horticulture at the Royal Botanic Garden Edinburgh by setting a bold strategic direction that aligns with our goals in biodiversity research, conservation, learning, visitor experience, community engagement, and organisational development.
- Inspire and lead the Horticulture division, championing excellence in standards, sustainability, and the care and curation of our Living Collections.
- Ensure smooth and safe operations through effective resource planning, risk management, and a strong commitment to health and safety for all.
- Collaborate as part of our Executive and Senior Leadership teams, contributing to a positive, inclusive culture and the successful leadership of the organisation.
- Engage with governance by attending Board of Trustees meetings and providing clear, impactful reporting on horticultural progress and priorities.
- Drive innovation in major projects, serving as the horticultural lead for Edinburgh Biomes and capital development programmes, and working closely with the Estates and Sustainability team to deliver infrastructure that supports net-zero ambitions and Scotland's National Outcomes.

Conservation Horticulture

- Lead innovations in conservation horticulture, working closely with the Science team to advance in and ex situ conservation, rare species propagation, and programmes for reintroduction and translocation — helping protect plant diversity for future generations.
- Champion plant health and resilience, overseeing policy and operations in horticulture in collaboration with the Science team to safeguard our collections and ecosystems.



- Foster collaboration across disciplines, partnering with Science, Estates and Sustainability, and Learning and Engagement teams to deliver integrated, innovative approaches to biodiversity conservation and ecological restoration.
- Shape strategies for global impact, developing horticultural plans that contribute to national and international conservation goals and support climate adaptation for a sustainable future.

Advocacy and Senior Influence

- Champion horticulture as a force for positive change, highlighting its vital role in tackling biodiversity loss, improving public health, building climate resilience, advancing urban greening, and promoting environmental education – locally and globally.
- Shape policy and partnerships for impact, influencing horticultural and environmental agendas by contributing to advocacy work and forging strong, collaborative relationships with governments, conservation organisations, and botanic institutions worldwide.
- Be a visible and trusted voice for horticulture, representing the organisation and the wider sector through active participation in networks, advisory bodies, media, and public forums – amplifying the importance of horticulture in addressing global challenges.
- Inspire and empower future generations, working with our Learning and Engagement, People and Organisational Development teams, and partners to promote horticulture as an inclusive, rewarding career through training, outreach, and visibility initiatives that welcome people from all backgrounds.

Income Development and Consultancy

- Lead the growth and delivery of horticultural consultancy services, working in partnership with our Centres of Excellence to share expertise in botanic garden development, biodiversity conservation, and plant health – helping clients create sustainable, thriving landscapes.
- Identify and develop mission-aligned opportunities that strengthen the organisation's financial sustainability while staying true to our values and global impact goals.
- Support fundraising success by working closely with the Development team on donor engagement, acquisition, and stewardship, ensuring every contribution makes a difference.
- Build meaningful partnerships with clients, stakeholders, and funders to expand our reach through innovative services, collaborative projects, and strategic alliances.

- Collaborative and inclusive leader, with high emotional intelligence and a strong commitment to championing equality, diversity, and inclusion in all aspects of work.
- Comprehensive expertise in conservation horticulture and living collections management, ensuring the highest standards of care and innovation.
- Outstanding communication and advocacy skills, with experience representing organisations confidently in public, policy, and media arenas.
- Strategic and solutions-focused thinker, skilled in budget and risk management, driving continuous improvement, and leading successful change initiatives.
- Passionate advocate for the future of horticulture, committed to inspiring new generations and widening access to horticultural careers for people from all backgrounds.

Desirable skills

- Hold a recognised qualification in horticulture, plant science, or a closely related field.
- Bring experience in developing or managing consultancy or commercial projects that advance horticulture or conservation goals.
- Understand UK and international biodiversity and environmental policy frameworks, and how they shape conservation practice.
- Collaborate effectively across sectors, with experience working on multi-partner conservation or greening projects involving public bodies, academia, and NGOs.
- Demonstrate knowledge of plant records systems and best practices for curating and caring for living collections.





TERMS OF APPOINTMENT

This role is based at the Royal Botanic Garden Edinburgh's HQ in the capital with regular travel to our gardens at Benmore, Dawyck and Logan, and occasional travel to elsewhere in the United Kingdom and overseas. Hybrid and flexible working are also possible.

We offer a generous employment package:

- Annually alongside your starting salary of £86,716 (pay award pending), the organisation contributes 28.97% of this towards you being a member of the defined benefit Civil Service Pension scheme. Your pension pot in this scheme will grow by 2.32% per year.
- 25 days holiday entitlement on appointment, increasing to 30 days after 5 years of service, with the option to buy additional holidays.
- 11.5 days of public and privilege holidays annually.
- A range of staff support mechanisms, including an employee assistance programme, cycle to work and staff discount schemes.
